# Welcome from the Headmistress

ISI Inspection Report, 2019

The theme of the 2019 Gazette is **Planet Earth**, and the girls have embraced this theme through the year with a myriad of activities, outings and workshops.

Enrichment Week focused on "Planet Earth" at Wilberforce House and "Impact" at Spencer House. The girls came off curriculum and spent a busy and inspirational week learning about aspects of life on earth and to understand what they can do to help the planet. Spencer House girls learnt all about our democracy, rule of law and how we can all impact the future of our country. Both Houses enjoyed creative arts workshops, using recycled materials to produce stunning works of art that were showcased throughout the school.

All this year, the staff and I had at the back of our minds the prospect that the ISI Inspectorate would visit before the end of the year and they did indeed arrive during the latter half of the Summer Term. This was our first quality inspection for nine years and I am thrilled by the inspection report and its endorsement of our work and ethos. The report refers to our excellent teaching staff, to the fact that, "staff ensure that every pupil is fully included and that their voice matters", and that, "staff provide excellent modelling of the values of inclusion and the importance of care for others."

There were also many lovely comments about our girls who "achieve strongly in a wide range of academic and other areas", and "display excellent attitudes to their learning." "They are highly curious, determined learners who display a palpable pride in their work and strive constantly to improve." All our girls are a real credit to this school and should feel proud of what they have achieved this year.

Our broad-based curriculum enables our girls to thrive, and although academic rigour and learning is at the heart of the school, our creative and sporting endeavours are equally successful. There have been many drama highlights this year, from the charming Reception Nativity and the ecologically themed Eddie the Penguin in Year 1, to the fantastic performances of Panto Pandemonium, Mary Poppins, and the Year 6 School of Rock, at Spencer House, the girls show commitment and talent in all they do. LAMDA continues to be a popular choice for the older girls and our excellent results show just how much they love to perform.

Sport has also had its successes and it has been lovely to see the numbers of girls participating in sports clubs and their enthusiasm and skills in matches and tournaments. Sports Day is always a highlight, and it is marvellous to see girls of all sporting abilities having fun with their friends and enjoying being active. I will make special mention of the Netball A team, who this year achieved the distinctions of winning the ISA Nationals and coming third in the IAPS Nationals.

Music at The Study continues to be a great strength with choirs, the orchestra and musical groups as well as in solo performance. I particularly enjoyed the Year 6 Choir's performance of Joseph and his Technicolour Dreamcoat at St Mary's Church in the Summer Term and the many music assemblies at Wilberforce House, showcasing the budding talent of our youngest musicians.

We have also enjoyed successes in visual art with many wins in ISA and RCA competitions, and Amara Khan in Year 2 saw her artwork emblazoned across the Royal College of Art's exterior and programme covers during its schools' exhibition.

Our language department continues to inspire our girls in French and Spanish, and this year the Year 5 girls took an unforgettable language trip to the Opal Coast in France, where they immersed themselves in the local culture and language, and sang at a local church on their final day.

Developing the house system has been a focus this year and we now have new House mottos, badges and even a House song at Wilberforce House. The Spencer House girls strive to work and behave well to gain points for their Houses and the announcement of the winning House of the week in Monday assemblies at Wilberforce House always causes a lot of excitement.

I extend my thanks to the Study Association which once again has been hugely active in supporting the school. The Committee has worked tirelessly to organise a host of successful events for girls and parents including the Christmas Fair, the Quiz Evening and the Summer Barbecue. My special thanks to Mrs Austin and Mrs Russell, the outgoing Chairs, and their Committee, who have done a fantastic job over the past two years. We extend a warm welcome to Ms Howard and her Committee, who have kindly agreed to take over the responsibility.

Thanks also go to Mrs Oakshett and Mrs Keating from EQPrep, who work closely with the school and help us by supporting and nurturing the mental health and wellbeing of our girls.

I would like to say a special thank you to all the staff, management, teaching and support, not only for the extra work that went into preparing for the ISI Inspection and helping to secure such a successful outcome, but for always being great ambassadors for the school. Finally, thanks to the Chair and the Board of Governors, especially for their time and support regarding the exciting development works at Wilberforce House. We are all excited by the prospect of six beautiful new classrooms, a large performance space, new school entrance and spacious library for the girls to enjoy.

We said goodbye to several members of our staff this year. We wish Miss Oldman all the best with an exciting headship role in her native New Zealand. We thank her for her contribution to the management team and to Year 6 and wish her well. Mrs Sawyer, housekeeper at Wilberforce House, retired after 16 years at The Study. No one could have been more versatile in her roles than Mrs Sawyer and nor could anyone have been kinder and more helpful to girls and staff alike. I know that the girls have loved their cookery lessons with her. We wish her every happiness in the future.

We will miss Miss McLellan and Miss Turpin, who were wonderful TAs and contributed a huge amount to the wider life of the school. We will certainly miss Miss Turpin's dance and drama skills. We thank Mrs Muir, not just for her excellent language teaching, but also for helping to bring about our very successful first residential trip to France, and Miss Mehta who did much to establish the new Computing curriculum and to develop the skills of both girls and staff. Farewell to Mr Fenby and Mr Younossi who slotted in so well during the time that they were with us. And finally we say goodbye to Miss Evans, who contributed so much not just to the PE Department, but also in developing the role of Houses in the school. We will really miss all of you, and wish you happiness and success with your future plans.

Year 6 girls achieved great success in their challenging 11+ papers. This was an exceptionally competitive year and I am so proud of what they have all achieved in gaining places and scholarships in a range of such good senior schools.

The ISI report refers to the school's succeeding in its aim to set pupils on the road to lifelong study by inculcating a love of knowledge and by equipping them with skills for their future study. I know that this very much applies to our Year 6 leavers and that they leave us as confident young people who will make the very best of all that their senior schools have to offer. We can be sure that they will go into the world and make a positive impact in all that they do.
