I am thrilled that we are nearing completion of our ambitious development project at Wilberforce House, an impressive building with six new classrooms, a new visitors' area, a beautiful library, and a large performing arts space, which will benefit all the girls' educational experience at the school. You will see on these pages a photographic timeline of the build, which shows just what an ambitious project it has been.

2020 has been another very successful year for our Year 6 girls, with a record amount of offers of places and no less than 40 scholarships offered to them by leading senior schools. We hope that they have now settled in well at their senior schools and wish them all well in the future. We hope that they will always keep in touch with us, and know that they are always welcome to visit us.

As we bid farewell to 2020, I think we are all ending the year a little wiser. We have had to become more creative to solve problems, most of us are certainly a lot more tech savvy but possibly most importantly, mindful to live in the present and be grateful for all we have.

## Farewell from Mrs Susan Pepper









During the term before I took up my post at The Study, I have to confess that I used to take walks up to the village and stand outside Spencer House hardly able to believe my luck that I was going to be Head there shortly. In fact, one day, the then Site Manager, John Jones, came out and asked me what I wanted: I don't think he believed me when I said I was the new Headmistress!

I have to say that the job has proved a lot more challenging at times than I imagined as I stood proudly outside the gates of Spencer House, and never more so than in my very final term, but I have no doubt that it has been the most stimulating and rewarding post that I have ever had.

When I look back over the past ten years, there have been many tangible changes at The Study including improvements to the buildings like the Reception classrooms, the Drama Room, the Science Lab and the other changes to the ground floor at Spencer House; the lovely new Spencer House playground; the sports facility at Beverley Meads; provision of lunches. The 11+ is often described as increasingly competitive, but it is fascinating to compare results from the start of my time at The Study to now. In 2011, when I joined, the Year 6 girls received offers from 14 schools and were awarded 4 scholarships. This year, the Year 6 girls received offers from 26 schools and were awarded 40 scholarships. It is interesting too that in 2011, there were applications to only two co-ed senior schools, whereas in 2020, that number had risen to nine. The curriculum has, of course, evolved over the ten years too with developments such as the Creative Curriculum, the growing emphasis on 'reasoning', the Jigsaw scheme in PSHE, and the introduction of Computing as a class subject and Spanish in Year 6.

One of my briefs when I joined The Study was to work on plans for a future major development at Wilberforce House. After the trials and tribulations of distilling ideas, formulating plans and obtaining planning permission, I had expected to leave The Study with the new building if not complete, virtually so. Sadly, with all the challenges and delays caused by COVID-19, this was not going to be the case, but I know that the new facility, when complete, is going to be a tremendous asset to the school for many years to come.

If I were to be asked what I have enjoyed most about my time at The Study, I would have no hesitation in saying the time spent directly with the children: in my RE and History lessons, in my Horse and Pony and Debating Clubs and in my weekly assemblies. Assemblies in particular have yielded many memorable moments from moving Remembrance assemblies, to thought provoking discussions on matters as diverse as the rebuilding of Notre Dame to 'whom should



we trust?' There were also the disasters: the watercress planting assembly where a Year 6 girl poured the water from too great a height, the butter churning assembly which was doomed to failure when I used single cream - and the times when the technology worked before I started but not at the crucial moment!

The Study above all else is about community and relationships and I have been fortunate to have enjoyed the support of so many lovely parents and amazing staff colleagues. It seems invidious to single anyone out as there are so many people who have done so much for me. However, I must make special mention of Joanna Gay, who has been the most kind and supportive Deputy that any Head could wish to have. And Jane Davis, who was such a rock to me throughout the ten years and whose loss has been devastating for me as for so many others.

Prior to The Study, my whole teaching career had been spent in senior schools and in taking up the post, I was stepping outside my comfort zone. However, from the moment I set foot in the school on my first visit, I was drawn to it by its happy and friendly atmosphere and the feeling that it was a supportive and thriving community of people who truly care. It is this unique spirit that has taken the school through the good times and the more challenging times and which makes it so appropriate that the theme of the 2020 Gazette is "In this Together".

I have no doubt that the school's special ethos will continue under my successor and I wish Miss Ellis and The Study every success in the future. I suspect that once again, you may see a tall figure in riding gear standing outside Spencer House from time to time!


## A Tempestuous Week!



## Living like Celts!

### A Trip to Butser farm


Year 4 girls enjoyed a fascinating visit to **Butser Ancient Farm**, an experimental archaeology site in the South Downs. The girls saw a traditional Celtic Round House, sat around a campfire on pelts, and made silver jewellery, mosaics and hazel wood fences.





Boudicca was a warrior queen and wife of Prasutagus the ruler of the Iceni tribe. The Celtic tribe Iceni was located in a part of Britain we now call Norfolk. Boudicca was tall with fiery red hair that hung to her waist. She had a harsh voice and a chilling glare. She habitually wore a large golden torc and a cloak fastened by a brooch. When Romans settled in southern Britain they made an agreement that Prasutagus could remain ruler of the Iceni, but when he died the Romans turned on the Iceni, and they captured tribesmen and whipped Boudicca and her daughters publicly. She was furious and gathered an army and started a rebellion. Boudicca's speech to her army was," I am fighting as someone like you who has lost their freedom. I am fighting from my bruised body. The Gods will grant us the revenge we deserve. Think of how many of us are fighting and why. Then you will win this battle or die. That is what I, a woman will do. Let the men live as slaves if they want. I will not!" She led a rebellion destroying three cities, including Londinium (London), Verulamium (St Albans) and a place we now know as Colchester. Over 70,000 people were killed in Boudicca's attacks. When the Romans heard of the attacks they regrouped and finally defeated Boudicca and her army in the Battle of Watling Street. To this day, no-one knows what happened to Boudicca.
